# EU Film Nights Opening Event



The EU Film Nights kicked off with an opening event held at the EU Infopoint in Nicosia in October 2025. The event, supported by the European Union, featured the screening of the compelling documentary *Once Upon a Time in a Forest*, which focuses on the struggle of young environmental activists in Finland to protect forests and defend nature. The documentary has been screened at international festivals and has received several awards.



The programme opened with speeches by the Ambassador of Finland to Cyprus, Päivi Peltokoski, and the Head of Unit of the European Commission's Cyprus Support Unit, Michel Vedrenne. In their remarks, they underlined cinema's important role as a tool that reflects diverse perspectives, experiences and traditions, while strengthening understanding and empathy among societies. Following the speeches, the event concluded with the film screening and a cocktail reception.

# Panel Discussion on “Digital Threats and the Human Factor: From EU Policies to Daily Life”

The EU Infopoint, in cooperation with the Chamber of Computer Engineers of the Turkish Cypriot community, organised a panel discussion titled “Digital Threats and the Human Factor: From EU Policies to Daily Life” as part of European Cybersecurity Awareness Month.



Supported by the European Union, the event addressed recent developments in the field of digital security, European Union policies, and the impact of risks encountered in the digital world on everyday life. The panel session featured presentations by Dr. Mateusz Labuz, researcher at the Institute for Peace Research and Security Policy at the University of Hamburg (IFSH); Prof. Dr. Arif Sarı, Information and Cybersecurity Expert and academic; and Ayşe Reyhan Boğar, Clinical Psychologist and researcher. Participants discussed the psychological, technical and policy dimensions of digital threats from a multidimensional perspective. The event concluded with a question-and-answer session.

## Panel Discussion Event: The EU's Green Vision: From Policy to Action

The EU Infopoint organised a panel discussion titled “The EU’s Green Vision: From Policy to Action” as part of the EU’s Green Vision campaign. Supported by the European Union, the event focused on the EU’s “3 Billion Trees by 2030” initiative, outlining its objectives, the progress achieved to date, and its significance at both local and European levels.

The panel session featured presentations by Jeanne-Lazya Roux, Researcher at

the European Forest Institute; Prof. Dr. Özge Özden, Ecology Expert; and Assoc. Prof. Dr. Nazım Kaşot, Biologist and Environmental Education Expert. The speakers provided in-depth insights into the policy and implementation dimensions of the EU’s afforestation objectives from a multidimensional perspective. The event concluded with a question-and-answer session, allowing participants to engage directly with the speakers.

The 2025 EU Investigative Journalism award ceremony was held in Nicosia with the participation of journalists and other stakeholders, during which the awards were presented to the winning journalists.

The first prize was awarded to Ayşemden Akın for her investigative series on organised crime networks in the northern part of Cyprus. The second prize went to Pinar Barut for her investigative series examining the trial process of five Greek Cypriots arrested in the northern part of Cyprus. The third prize was awarded to Serap Şahin for her investigative work on the “right to be forgotten”.
